#### Job Banks:

InternshipPrograms.com: Here you can refine search by field of interest and locations.

**Indeed Worldwide:** Search for global chapters or country-specific chapters of professional associations.

**U.S. Department of State:** The biggest employer of Americans abroad.

**<u>USAJOBS</u>**: Federal agency vacancies, including worldwide positions, are listed here in the Office of Personnel Management's online job posting system.

#### **Placement Programs:**

International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE): Offers international placements for students in technical fields. Can also help in obtaining work permits.

**The Peace Corps:** Recruits U.S. Citizens for 2 year periods to serve as volunteers in developing countries. Contact the Peace Corps office in the U-M International Center.

**Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO):** A UK-based organization which provides volunteer placements worldwide for a variety of professionals. Americans should apply through the Canadian office.

#### **General Funding Resources**

**<u>UMSI Internship Grant</u>**: The UMSI Internship Grant is designed to support UMSI students, regardless of citizenship, pursuing high-quality spring/summer internships both domestically and internationally. You can find more information on the program on M-Compass.

#### Funding Resources for **Graduate Students**

CAORC Fellowships: The Council of American **Overseas Research** Centers provides several scholarships.

#### **Institute of** International Education (IIE) Fulbright Awards:

The International Institute administers the Fulbright competition for University of Michigan students; more information is available from U-M International Institute.

#### Social Science Research **Council Summer** Fellowships:

Fellowships available for doctoral students and faculty to participate in a summer institute and research individually while in residence at the host institution. Individual opportunities vary from year to year.

#### **Funding Resources for Library & Archives Students**

#### ALA International Relations Office:

Includes information on funding, international exchange opportunities, and international library projects.

ALA Discussion Groups: International Librarianship: Includes the International Relations Roundtable and geographic-specific discussion groups.

#### The Bogle Pratt International Library Travel Award:

Enables members of the American Library Association (ALA) to travel to an international conference for the first time. Applicants must be members of the ALA who show evidence of involvement in career-related international activities or scholarship.

#### National Library of Australia Fellowships:

The National Library of Australia offers several paid, 12week fellowships. This fellowship enables librarians, archivists, or conservators to conduct research at the National Library of Australia. The application deadline is April of each year. Application and further information available online.

#### Harold Lancour Scholarship for Foreign Study:

This scholarship is administered by Beta Phi Mu, the International Library and Information Science Honor Society. Current students are not eligible for the award, as applicants must hold a MLIS or equivalent. Due to budgetary constraints, the Harold Lancour Scholarship will be closed for 2022, but check online for updates for the following year.
